## THE THANKSGIVING EVE INTERFAITH SERVICE

For most of my thirty-seven years as a Catholic priest, I have spent Thanksgiving Eve at an ecumenical or interfaith prayer service. In my first assignment, I was part of a ministerial association that had sponsored a Thanksgiving Eve Service since the early 1960s. Our "Hermosa Ministerium" was congenial, respectful of differences, and able to work together for common causes. Like the Mayfair ministers with whom I would collaborate in the 1980s and early 1990s, the Hermosa group was exclusively Christian. When I moved to Skokie, I joined the Jewish-Christian "Niles Township Clergy Forum." The "Forum" had been a cohesive entity since the early 1970s when the American Nazi Party threatened a march through Skokie. I felt very honored to part of the Forum and help to plan the annual Thanksgiving Eve Service for thirteen years.

After the tragic terrorist attack on the World Trade Center Towers on September 11, 2001, the Clergy Forum became more interreligious, with participants from Buddhism, Islam, Hinduism, and the Bahai Community. And the nature of the service also changed. In the way we adapted our service, we followed Pope John Paul Il's example when he gathered representatives of the world's religions at Assisi in October of 1986 to pray for peace. "The Assisi Model," as it came to be known, did not minimize or ignore fundamental differences. There was no attempt to produce a "Common Prayer." "The Assisi Model" advocated "being together in order to pray." This unique formula for interreligious prayer service manifests respect for the prayer of others and the attitude of others before the Divinity. It is also a humble and sincere witness of our faith in Christ, Lord of the Universe. The above description is a paraphrase of Pope John Paul's own words.

This past summer I asked Fr. Dennis O'Neill of St. Martha's Parish/ and a member of the Morton Grove Clergy Group/ if I might join. Since part of St. Isaac

Jogues Parish is in Morton Grove, I was welcomed as a member. I am grateful to be part of this year's service at the Northwest Suburban Jewish Congregation. It is a forty-three year tradition. I hope St. Isaac Jogues Parish will be well-represented.

This year's annual Thanksgiving Interfaith Service will be at the Northwest Suburban Jewish Congregation at 7800 W. Lyons in Morton Grove on Wednesday, November $\mathbf{2 1}^{\text {st }}$ at 7:30 p.m.

Respect Life: Another Face - Domestic Violence

The City of Chicago and the US Conference of Catholic Bishops know the sad fact of domestic violence and have taken steps to help victims and their loved ones recognize abuse. The following are statements or questions they have put forth which may signal an abusive relationship.
"Someone you know may be in an abusive relationship. It's a sign of abuse if her partner...

- Calls her names, insults her, constantly criticizes her, or humiliates her
- Isolates her from family and friends
- Monitors where she goes and how she spends her time
- Controls finances, refuses to share money, or gives her an allowance
- Threatens to have her deported or to report her to a welfare agency
- Threatens to take the children away
- Threatens to kill or hurt her, the children, other family members, or pets
- Threatens her with a weapon
- Destroys property, such as household furnishings
- Pushes, slaps, hits, bites, kicks or chokes her
- Forces her to have sex or to perform sexual acts" (1)
"Does your friend's or family member's partner:
- Control and criticize them in front of others?
-Violently lose their temper?
- Act extremely jealous?
- Constantly check up on them?
"Does your friend or family member:
- Become quiet or intimidated around their partner?
- Have unexplained injuries or bruises?
- Dismiss the abuse as 'not a big deal'?
- Fear upsetting their partner?" (2)

## ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.
Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the correct spelling of the sick person's name. If a family member, they will be required to give their name for our records.

Thank you for your patience regarding this new process. We wish to do all we can to offer our parish community the opportunity to offer prayers for those who are ill - but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our congregation are entitled to their privacy in this regard.
