From the Pastor

**“REFLECTIONS FOR A LENTEN JOURNEY”
Tolstoy’s Metaphor for Greed**



Leo Tolstoy

Lent begins with the "naked" truth! In the Garden of Eden, Adam and Eve were given everything they needed to be happy. God withheld nothing except what was certain to make them unhappy. The fruit of the tree of the knowledge of good and evil promises divine life, but will deliver death!

“From the tree you shall not eat; the moment you eat from it you are surely doomed to die.”

Since Eden, "Everyman" and "Everywoman" has been tempted. The devil devised the seduction and we reach for what is beyond our grasp. He relies on Adam’s hunger for forbidden fruit and ours for more and more and more! The "naked" truth is in this core revelation:

“What profit would a man show if he were to gain the whole world and and destroy himself in the process?”

It flies in the face of our possession - crazed and success - driven culture. While contemporary America is very much unlike nineteenth century Russia, the great storyteller, Leo Tolstoy has much to say to us about greed. In "How Much Land Does a Man Need?" he offers a timeless, Christian metaphor for those who would "gain the whole world" but destroys themselves in the process.

I saw "How Much Land Does a Man Need?" as an eleven year old. It was presented on a television series called "My Favorite Story." For James Joyce, Tolstoy's story was "the greatest story that the literature of the world knows." For me, it is a hauntingly unforgettable tale in any medium. It is an inspired Lenten meditation.

Pahom, a landless peasant in Old Russia, works hard and has nothing to show for his efforts. He yearns to be a land owner. Yet, for all his worthy ambition, he has fatal pride. He states: "If I had plenty of land, I should not fear the devil himself." As if part of some infernal plan, he begins to acquire property. He is clever. He is insightful. He speculates and prospers. He buys land. He sells, and moves on. He buys more land. At first he is satisfied. But, as he yearns for more, he is led into the greatest temptation. A traveller from the land of the Bashkirs tells him about an irresistible proposition. He can gain thousands of acres for a few small gifts and simple bargaining. The cash investment will be small, but the profit will be staggering. Pahom follows the advice. He impresses the Bashkirs. He makes a "sweetheart deal." He may choose whatever land he wishes. The price? One thousand rubles for a day of land! "A day of land!" Pahom asks, "What kind of measure is that?" How many acres could that be?



This proves to be Pahom's downfall. A "day of land" is as much as he can stake from sunrise to sunset.

Pahom can hardly wait. For most of the night, he cannot sleep. When he has a brief respite, he has a nightmare. He dreams that he is dead at the feet of the devil, who is laughing. The dream disturbs Pahom, but it does not stop him. Eagerly he begins his trek before sunrise. He feels strong and optimistic. But, as the day wears on, he grows tired, and feverish. As he strains toward the finish, his fear of death returns. Approaching his goal, he collapses. All cheer his victory! But alas, all is lost. His nightmare comes true! Pahom is dead! His servant picks up a spade and digs a grave. Tolstoy's final lines are devastating:

“Six feet from his head to his heels was all he needed.”

At age eleven, I was deeply impressed. I never forgot Tolstoy's story. I recommend it for **your** Lenten journey!

Help! Collections are falling!

Our collections continue to lag behind our budget. The chart below shows that we have fallen behind our budget by an additional \$3,000 in the first two weeks of February. This brings us to a shortfall of \$9,601 for the year! This drop in collections will have a serious impact upon the Parish's financial health. We projected a balanced budget for this fiscal year. To achieve this balance between income and expenses salary increases for the parish staff were eliminated and spending was reduced where possible. We need every worshipper's help to overcome the shortfall in collections.

Each weekend we have almost 1,800 worshippers at St. Isaacs. If each person increases their contribution by just \$2.00 a week we will be able to meet our budget and avoid the consequences of a budget deficit. Please help.

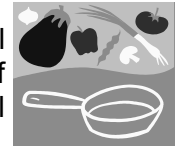
HUMAN CONCERNS

**February is American Heart Month
Kids and Heart Health**

It seems that much of what is written about American Heart Month is directed to adults. After all, heart disease is their leading cause of death. We should not, though, construe this to mean that kids are immune to heart disease or should be ignored. I haven't seen statistics, but kids can have heart disease. They can be felled by strokes. Kids can suffer cardiac events. Underlying factors include congenital (present at birth) diseases & disorders, heredity, & illnesses like sickle cell anemia, inflammatory bowel disease & autoimmune disorders. Perhaps their greatest risks, though, come from living in our Western society!

When it comes to the US diet, make it FAST & SUPER-SIZE ME. With families on the run from one activity to another, two parents working & our troubled economy, McD's & other such food purveyors offer a quick meal fix & a bargain to boot. If the car seems to automatically "turn" at the site of the golden arches or carhops

know your kids' names & schedules, there may have a problem. If we continue to regularly fill them up with fat-laden foods & sugary drinks, we are likely to produce a generation of Americans with increased waist sizes, BMIs, weight, blood pressure & cholesterol & who will face diabetes & heart disease at earlier ages. Not a desirable legacy for today's kids!



The lure of video gaming, TV, computers, on-line or text communication are keeping this generation tied to couches, chairs & the great indoors. One needn't leave the comfort of home in order to be entertained or stay in touch. Lack of regular (beyond gym class) moderate to moderately intense exercise will contribute to the above as well. The combination of high fat/ carbohydrate diets & inactivity is causing an alarming increase in Type II diabetes in our young people. This in & of itself is a concern, but more so because "most diabetics die from cardiovascular disease." (Dr. Tedd Mitchell, HealthSmart, USA Weekend, Feb.12-14, 2010, pg.11)

Another "minus" to our modern culture is stress. Kids are being pressured to be more, do more. Achievement is expected in the classroom & beyond. AP courses are pushed & demanded. Only the "A" team will do. One has to play in a travel club. If one wants to get into the best college, a student must... Some stress can be positive, but too much or stress of long duration can also lead to high blood pressure, CV disease & behaviors (smoking, drinking, unhealthy diet) that, secondarily, can lead to the same.



Next time your tempted to grab fast food for the family, consider a home-cooked one with salad & veggies in the mix. Next time the kids want a movie, bundle everyone up and, instead, have a snowball fight. Next time they have a test or project, help them get started earlier & provide outlets for relaxation. Let's give them & their hearts a chance!

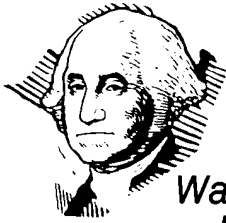
MASS INTENTIONS

According to the Code of Canon Law 948: Separate Masses must be applied for the intentions of those for whom an individual offering, even if small, has been made and accepted.

What is normative in the practice of the Church is that there be separate individual Masses offered for individual intentions. Therefore, the practice of combining individual intentions on a regular basis has ceased at St. Isaac Jogues Parish.

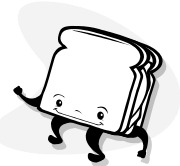

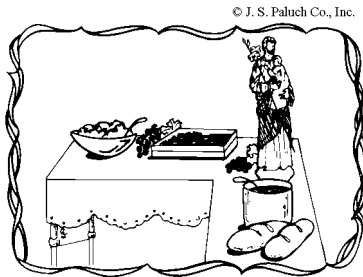

REMEMBER

Once again the Church invites us to enter the desert of repentance. That desert, as today's first reading reminds us, is also a desert of remembrance. This holy season summons us to remember all that God has done for us. Like the Israelites who recalled their captivity and God's work to free them from the Egyptians, we, too, recall those times when we were held captive by sin and experienced freedom through the gift of God's redeeming love.

Saint Paul tells us that the word of God is near us; it is in our mouths and in our hearts. May that sacred word prompt us to remember God's great work of reconciliation in our lives and in our community. As this season of Lent unfolds, let us take to heart these words of Saint Paul and spend these forty days calling upon the name of the Lord, asking for forgiveness and healing.

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SAINT POLYCARP (died 155) February 23

"Eighty-six years I have served Christ, and he never did me any wrong. How can I blaspheme my King and Savior?" Boldly answering the official who demanded he worship pagan gods, Polycarp, today's "Senior Citizen Saint," demonstrates that courage, far from being the preserve of the young, is a virtue cultivated through life-long fidelity and crowned by final perseverance. A disciple of Saint John who is said to have consecrated him bishop of Smyrna in modern day Turkey, Polycarp witnesses to the truth that, whatever time and space may separate us, Jesus' gift of the Eucharist unites us. Polycarp's final words, preserved by the Church of Smyrna, sound like a Eucharistic Prayer in which the saint offers himself: "Lord, almighty God, Father of your beloved and blessed Son Jesus Christ, through whom we have come to the knowledge of yourself may I be received among the martyrs as a rich and pleasing sacrifice through the eternal priest of heaven, Jesus Christ through him be glory to you, together with him and the Holy Spirit, now and forever. Amen."

ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.

Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the **correct spelling** of the sick person's name. If a **family member**, they will be required to give **their** name for our records.
