## CORPUS CHRISTI AND THE CONVERT WHO NEVER CONVERTED

G.K. Chesterton's Orthodoxy played an important part in my rediscovering the Catholic Faith. It is a book that is fanciful, intellectually engaging, and profoundly joyful! I love Chesterton's proposed "romance" about an English yachtsman who miscalculated his course and, instead of finding a new, exotic island in the South Seas, actually "discovers" England!

Chesterton admitted playfully, "I am that man in the yacht. I discovered England." Of course, what he was really admitting was that "with utmost daring (he had) discovered what had been discovered before" Christian Orthodoxy. In that same sense, I join Chesterton in saying, "I discovered England" too!

My "apologia pro vita sua" begins with the line: "It all began with Vatican II"... A newfound interest in religion made Theology interesting, and Liturgy in particular. The possibilities of renewing and reforming the Church were very exciting. Without being too original, I saw myself as a "radical" - one who dared to return to the roots of belief and worship. I was impatient with the gaudy, baroque trappings of "Italianate" Catholicism. The multiplicity of devotions struck me as an overcrowded mantlepiece obscuring the real treasure of the Church. In my view, "It was time to cleanse the Temple." I felt very "prophetic" and sure of myself at 20 !

In my senior year of college, I opted for an elective on Ecumenism. It was taught by a remarkable Jesuit, Fr. David Bowman. Fr. Bowman gave us an unusual assignment: go out to a particular religious group, read about them, attend their services, bring a speaker back to class, and do a major paper on the group. With this challenge there was also a caveat: know what the Church's guidelines are and do not receive Communion in a non-Catholic Christian Community.

My choice was to explore "Anglo-Catholicism." AngloCatholics were more than "High Church" Anglicans. They had been inspired by the Oxford Movement to return the theology of the Fathers of the Church and a "Catholic" interpretation of the Reformation. But Anglo-Catholics were most concerned with a restoration of "Catholic" worship. That included Sunday Mass, Confession, a full range of sacramentals and devotions. I was "hooked."

I shall never forget the day I first visited the Episcopal Church of the Atonement near Loyola University. What greeted me in the narthex was a tastefully framed parchment that reminded all who entered:

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The Blessed Sacrament
is reserved in
this Church.
Please show reverence
for the Real Presence.
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Upon entering the Church, the "feeling" was totally "Catholic." There was a red sanctuary lamp, a tabernacle and six very tall High Mass candles on the altar. That was the beginning of my fascination with what seemed a "mirror reflection" of Roman Catholicism or, as Anglicans often put it, "Catholicism with a difference."

In my year-long association with Anglo-Catholics, something was beginning to change my "radical," vision. I looked carefully at this "mirror reflection" of Catholicism. As I relished the chant, polyphony, and hymns, I decided to return to the religious' practices I had all but given up. The strange thing was that what some laughingly referred to as "Anglican Fever" was actually a gradual "defrosting" of my own Roman Catholicism.

The real turning point for me was my first Corpus Christi Procession and Benediction. Yes, it was in an Episcopal Church - St. Luke's in Evanston. What an awesome and beautiful celebration! I remember writing a friend at St. Meinrad Archabbey a four page descriptive letter about my experience. In the letter, it was obvious that Anglo-Catholicism had brought me back to a deep appreciation of the Eucharist, the Blessed Virgin, and the whole Catholic tradition of ritual and devotion.

Shortly after Corpus Christi, 1964, I discerned a vocation to the priesthood. In the upheaval that followed Vatican II, I found comfort and strength in the Most Holy Eucharist during my seminary days. The Benedictine Convent across the Lake from Mundelein Seminary had Perpetual Adoration, regular Eucharistic Processions, beautiful, reverent Masses, Divine Office and Benediction.

I have shared much with Anglicans since Ordination. I have many good Episcopalian friends. While there have been many serious strains in the relationship between Canterbury and Rome, I remain grateful for past memories of more hopeful prospects for unity. I am impressed with many courageous AngloCatholics who have come over to Rome - among them, Fr. James Parker, Fr. Stanley Klores, and Msgr. Graham Leonard (the former Anglican Bishop of London). I pray often for them and those who have remained Anglican.

As I am edified by the growing appeal of Eucharistic Adoration and Corpus Christi Processions, I am also happy to share the story of the "convert who never converted". May I ask your prayers too for all our separated brothers and sisters who believe in the Real Presence. May they continue to inspire others, like me, to find their faith "through a glass darkly." That discovery can change a marginal, generic Christian to a committed Catholic.
"Let us forever adore the most Holy Sacrament!"

## The Meaning of Corpus Christi

The Solemnity of Corpus Christi is the solemn, public feast of the Eucharist, the sacrament of the Body and Blood of Christ: on this day, the mystery instituted at the Last Supper and commemorated every year on Holy Thursday is manifested to all, in the midst of the fervor of faith and devotion of the Ecclesial Community.

Indeed, the Eucharist is the "treasure" of the Church, the precious heritage that her Lord has left to her. And the Church preserves it with the greatest care, celebrating it daily in holy Mass, adoring it in churches and chapels, administering it to the sick, and as viaticum to those who are on their last journey.

However, this treasure that is destined for the baptized does not exhaust its radius of action in the context of the Church: the Eucharist is the Lord Jesus who gives himself "for the life of the world" (Jn 6: 51). In every time and in every place, he wants to meet human beings and bring them the life of God. And this is not all. The Eucharist also has a cosmic property: the transformation of the bread and the wine into Christ's Body and Blood is in fact the principle of the divinization of creation itself.

For this reason, the Feast of Corpus Christi is characterized particularly by the tradition of carrying the Most Holy Sacrament in procession, an act full of meaning. By carrying the Eucharist through the streets and squares, we desire to immerse the Bread come down from heaven in our daily lives. We want Jesus to walk where we walk, to live where we live. Our world, our existence, must become his temple.

On this feast day, the Christian Community proclaims that the Eucharist is its all, its very life, the source of life that triumphs over death. From communion with Christ in the Eucharist flows the charity that transforms our life and supports us all on our journey towards the heavenly Homeland. For this reason the liturgy makes us sing, "Good Shepherd, true read... You who know all things, who can do all things, who nourish us while on earth, lead your brethren to the heavenly banquet in the glory of your Saints."

Mary is the "Woman of the Eucharist" as Pope John Paul II described her in his encyclical Ecclesia de Eucharistia. Let us pray to the Virgin that all Christians may deepen their faith in the Eucharistic mystery, to live in constant communion with Jesus and be his effective witness.

## RELIGIOUS EDUCATION NEWS

* Registration for the 2007-2008 Religious Education Program has begun! Families who were in the 20062007 RE Program are to turn in their registration forms by this Friday, June $15^{\text {th }}$. After June $15^{\text {th }}$ families currently in the program may still register, based on grade-level availability, but a late fee of $\$ 25$ per family will be assessed from June 16-August 1. After August $1^{\text {st }}$ the late fee will be $\$ 35$. If you are unsure if you are moving, we strongly encourage you to register your child to assure a place for them.

New families are welcome to register now! You will need to fill out a family form and a student form for each child entering the program. Please also provide a copy of each child's baptismal certificate. If they were in a Catholic School or a parish Religious Education Program, a letter from that parish stating their participation is requested.

Kindergarten RE Classes meet on Sundays, 10:3011:30 a.m. Grades 1-Confirmation Year II meet on Mondays, 6:45-8:00 p.m. Those preparing for Sacraments must be in RE Classes (parish program or Catholic School) for at least two years prior to receiving a Sacrament.

Tuition for the 2007-2008 RE Program is $\$ 140$ for one child; $\$ 250$ for 2 children; $\$ 300$ for three or more children. This is the parishioner rate - those registered here, who worship regularly, and who support the parish through monetary contributions (using church envelopes) or service. Non-parishioners' tuition rates are $\$ 215$ for one child; $\$ 325$ for two children; $\$ 375$ for three or more children. This includes registered parishioners who do not use church envelopes or donate time in service to the parish. Sacrament fees are $\$ 45-1^{\text {st }}$ Reconciliation and $1^{\text {st }}$ Communion; $\$ 10-$ Confirmation Year I; \$25-Confirmation Year II. Please note that no one is excluded because of an inability to pay. If you have a financial concern, please contact the Religious Education Office, 847/966-1180.

Please contact us as well to discuss possible options for children in special education and for older children who have not been in religious education and have not received sacraments. We will do our best to support your families' efforts to share the faith. Please call Dolores Stanton at the RE Office, 847/966-1180.

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## ADDING NAMES TO THE PARISH SICK LIST

It has always been the policy of St. Isaac Jogues to offer our parish community an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. We have tried to keep close track of these names for our Bulletin as they are made available to us.

However, now we face an important privacy issue, very much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes.

We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission.

We appreciate the fact that often friends, neighbors, and acquaintances wish to do something special for a person who is ill, and ask to place their name on the list to be prayed for. While their intentions are surely good, we simply can no longer accept names in this manner.

We will institute a new process regarding calling in names for the Bulletin list.
Names for the sick list placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family. At the time they call in the name, they will be asked whether they are the sick person him/ herself, or a member of their family, and if they give permission for the name to be placed on the list. They will be asked for the correct spelling of the sick person's name. If a family member, they will be required to give their name for our records.

Thank you for your patience regarding this new process. We wish to do all we can to offer our parish community the opportunity to offer prayers for those who are ill - but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our congregation are entitled to their privacy in this regard.
