

ADVENT : IMAGINATION

It's Advent. And the work-a-day world has been decked with boughs of holly and twinkling lights. . . even before Thanksgiving and "Black Friday." We have entered that zone of celebration called "**THE HOLIDAYS.**" When I was a child, people of Christian faith protested the commercial abbreviation "X-MAS." There were lively campaigns to put CHRIST back in Christmas. Today there seems to be an opposing force committed to take CHRIST out of everything!

For years, I have fought a "quiet crusade" to introduce people to Advent. It has been a time overlooked or ignored. Advent seems to get in the way of celebrating "THE HOLIDAYS." It is a thoughtful, enlightening preparation for Christmas. It is a "journey" inward to make room for Christ. It is a "journey" back to the roots of Faith. But it also moves us out of ourselves to recognize that the Christ we receive is the Christ we must give to one another.

The customs of Advent are beautiful. The Advent Wreath, the "Jesse Tree," the "O Antiphons" give real substance to our anticipation of the Nativity of the Savior. **Simbang Gabi and Las Posadas** are treasures of inclusive Advent piety - - "gifts" shared by our multicultural American Catholic Church. Exploring different Advent and Christmas customs can be an antidote for the "disease" of popular secularism! Reflecting on our traditions gives them new life. What is old can become what is new!

More than anything else, as Christians, we should use this time before Christmas well. In my Advent articles this year, I would like to emphasize **IMAGINATION.** My "inspiration" is J. R. R. Tolkien, the brilliant scholar and author of **The Hobbit** and **The Lord of the Rings.** Of Tolkien, Edwina Gately writes:

As a devout Catholic intellectual, he felt that such creative use of our imagination was a reflection of God's own creative activity, God in whose image we are made.


Advent is like a dark room or an empty canvas. We are challenged to light it and fill it. Imagination brings to life even Sacred Scripture. The Word of God is as "living and active" as we allow it to be. The power is there, but we must "take and read."

The lives of the Saints and their reflections can also activate the "Advent Imagination." A regular bulletin feature this Advent will be taken from **The Little Way** through Advent - - reflections of St. Therese of Lisieux. There are few saints more Advent-like than St. Therese. She sees everything in the light of love!


Another aspect of the Advent Imagination is found in "stories," old and new. This week's article appeared in the bulletin six years ago. It is about my childhood "experience" of a serialized radio program called "**The Cinnamon Bear.**" It is more than a reverie of "radio days," it is encouragement to use your Advent Imagination.

In weeks to come, I would like to say more about J. R. R. Tolkien. I confess I've never read his books or even seen the films, but thanks to an EWTN interview with author Joseph Pearce about his new book **Bilbo's Journey,** I finally "discovered" Tolkien. People have warned me that could be Hobbit forming!

Advent Anticipation: A Lesson from “Radio Days”

If you grew up with television, I feel a little sorry for you. I was eight years old when my parents invested in a 16 inch **Sentinel** television set. In its handsome mahogany cabinet—with doors closed—it actually looked like our old console radio. But... there was a difference—one that would eventually make the images more important than imagination!

For “pre-Baby Boomers” there is a nostalgia for “Radio Days.” At this time of the year, I fondly recall a fifteen minute children’s serial that ran from Thanksgiving until Christmas Eve. It was called “**The Cinnamon Bear.**”

As far as I was concerned, all the other radio heroes—Straight Arrow, Superman, and the Green Hornet—could be pre-empted or lost in transcription. Just give me Paddy O’Cinnamon!

I used to curl up in a corner near our impressive console radio. Every day, I was welcomed to “Maybe Land,” I could forget about homework, lima beans, and the Packard roadster I hadn’t put back in the toy chest. For a quarter hour, I could “de-grow” like Jim and Judy Barton and join Paddy O’Cinnamon on his quest for the Silver Star stolen by the devious and elusive Crazy Quilt Dragon!

It was over all too quickly, but vivid impressions, expectations, and a special wonder grew from one episode to another. How could Jim, Judy, and Paddy ever escape from “Looking Glass Valley” or the curse of the “Wintergreen Witch”? The broadcast would conclude with “Tune in tomorrow!” And I could hardly wait. Nothing seemed more important!

A few years ago, I received a wonderful Christmas gift—authentic audio tapes, I felt like a child again. It was almost like it was 1949. Paddy O’Cinnamon’s velvety Irish tenor was the same even if the orchestration sounded all “warbly-warp.”

It had been 61 years since Crazy Quilt Dragon last surrendered the Silver Star at the North Pole, and Jim and Judy finally placed it atop their Christmas Tree. After 61 years, Paddy O’Cinnamon remains a better role model and mentor than a horde of Hollywood super heroes! Because of Paddy, waiting for Christmas was almost as good as Christmas itself.

Long before I learned about Advent and its theme of “joy in waiting,” **The Cinnamon Bear** taught me that anticipation means “enjoy the journey as well as the destination.”

I suppose we never outgrow impatience. Impatience is the inability to wait with grace. T.S. Elliot, the poet who recognized this universal, modern neurosis, observes:

*Teach us to care, and not care...
Teach us to sit still.*

And in the **Epistle of James** (5:7-10), the apostle advises:

Be patient... See how a farmer awaits the precious yield of the soil... steady your hearts, because the coming of the Lord is at hand. Do not grumble against one another... lest you be condemned.

Taking his advice, here’s a formula that can help us to wait with grace:

1. **Sit still**
2. **Trust God**
3. **Think of others, first**

This simple formula won’t recapture the magic of a child anticipating Christmas. But, as adults, it can help us to use time well and to be happy that we have time to use. **Watch and pray!**




IMMACULATE CONCEPTION

My heart overflows with gratitude when I think of this inestimable treasure which must cause a holy jealousy to the angels of the heavenly court. Today, I will...

Monday: Isaiah 2:1-5; Matthew 8:5-11

You know, O my God, I have never desired anything but to love You, and I am ambitious for no other glory. Today, I will...

Tuesday: Isaiah 11:1-10; Luke 10:21-24

Oh! How happy I am to see myself imperfect and to be in need of God's mercy. Today, I will...

Wednesday: Isaiah 25:6-10a; Matthew 15:29-37

Our Lord died on the Cross in anguish, and yet His was the most beautiful death of love. Today, I will...

Thursday: Isaiah 26:1-6; Matthew 7:21, 24-27

YEAR OF SUNDAY MASS: QUESTION OF THE WEEK

Read Luke 21:25-28, 34-36. The Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist is urgently "NOW!" – What one thing have I put off doing which would help make me whole with others and the Son of Man?

KNOW THE MASS, ONE WORD AT A TIME: EAT

"We don't usually connect praying with eating. But that is exactly what we do, as we pray at Mass and eat the bread of life in Holy Communion. Prayer in all its different forms moves us towards God. Eating the bread of life in Holy Communion moves the Lord towards us, actually, bringing his presence within us.

"This praying and eating at Mass seems, at first, simply to be very personal. It is an intimate action that touches us in the core of our being. Indeed, it is. At the same time, notice something else. At Mass we pray and eat together. So, when we eat the bread of life, we are in deep communion with our saving Lord. And in him, we are also in deep communion with each other."


